Our Story

There are thousands of stray animals in Sri Lanka suffering from horrific injuries, malnutrition and disease. Dogs and cats with fractured spines, severed limbs and maggot infested wounds; pups and kittens living on festering rubbish dumps; animals slowly dying of tick fever, womb infections and bleeding tumours, suffering in agony until they die. With the risk and associated fear of rabies, strays are often demonised, leading to cruelty at the hands of humans. This ocean of suffering and misery is heart breaking for any animal lover to witness, let alone walk away from. Animal SOS Sri Lanka, a UK registered charity, was founded on the vision of Kim Cooling who, after witnessing the appalling plight of animals there, particularly the strays, decided to take action to help them. With a distinct lack of effective animal protection laws, safe havens and veterinary care available to street animals in Sri Lanka, our work and facilities are a lifeline to many otherwise doomed animals.

JANUARY-DECEMBER 2023

- We are currently caring for 2200 dogs and 21 cats at the sanctuary
- We provided over 30,000 treatments for disease, wounds, fractures and tumours
- We sterilized 800 dogs and cats and conducted 50 other surgeries
- We provided over 11,000 blood tests smears/ biochemistry/haematology
- We provided over 12,000 anti-parasitic treatments (worming, mange, tick/flea treatments)
- We provided over 11,000 vaccinations against rabies and other deadly viruses
- We feed around 2,500 cats and dogs EVERY day and operate the largest feeding program and largest animal sanctuary for street animals in Sri Lanka.

BUTTERCUP AND BABIES

Living on the streets, particularly the busy roads in Sri Lanka, is hazardous for Man's best friends. In November, we heard about a pregnant dog left disabled and helpless in a road after an accident. We knew she would die a horrible death, so took her in. These cases always break our hearts.

Named Buttercup, we struggled to keep her alive as she had bladder issues and difficulty urinating. Her pups had survived the accident according to the scans we conducted, but we had to catheterize Buttercup and closely monitor the progression of her pregnancy. Cases like this always pose a huge clinical challenge as disabled dogs often need caesarean sections because they can't give birth naturally. However, the timing of the surgery is absolutely critical for the survival of the pups. So, when we thought the time was right, we acted and, to our huge relief, 5 pups were delivered alive and well.

These are the cases we are helping day in and day out, dogs that would not survive without us. We are thrilled to report that Buttercup and her babies are all doing well.


BEATEN PUPS

We heard that 4 pups (all female) had been cruelly dumped in our village and were being beaten by kids and villagers. There are so many dumped pups on the roads and in the village. Despite free neutering, we suspect many of these pups are from owned dogs and their owners neglecting to get them spayed. We also witness a huge amount of animal cruelty on a daily basis and this is why our project is so important in Sri Lanka. We rescued the beaten pups, and they are now at the sanctuary. The endemic dumping of pups places the sanctuary under considerable pressure.













We endeavour to home as many rehabilitated and healthy dogs and cats as possible. We do, however, have to regularly check on the welfare of all homed SOS animals and continue giving veterinary support and vaccinations during their lifetime.

Scrumpy was a street dog from Sri Lanka.

He was disabled in an accident and sick with distemper and babesia gibsoni (a dangerous tick-borne disease) He was pitifully dragging himself along a busy road and doomed.

However, his fate changed because we took him in.









Gluey was mentioned in the last newsletter. She was the disabled puppy that arrived covered in glue and also battling babesia. She survived and is thriving under our care as you can see.

This sweet kitten was found in the road with her intestines out. We conducted emergency surgery to save her life. We are pleased to report that Matilda survived and is recovering well at the sanctuary.











PAYTON

Payton arrived as a weak, disabled puppy and covered in ticks. She most likely met with an accident like so many dogs living on the streets. We are pleased to report that she made a full recovery and is walking tall now.

KENDRICK

The poor male pup arrived at the sanctuary covered in used engine oil, which is highly toxic to dogs. There is a common myth in Sri Lanka that covering dogs in engine oil heals skin complaints. These myths and ignorance cause huge animal suffering and deaths. It's yet another battle we face doing this work.

Kendrick was emaciated, weak, and had tickborne diseases Babesia and E.Canis.

We are pleased to say we saved his life and he is now a transformed and happy boy.

ZULU Zulu was pitifully crying for help after an accident on the road and being left helpless and in absolute agony. In reality, there is very little help for accident cases like him in Sri Lanka. Many just walk past and there are very few orgs that offer a lifeline and rehabilitation to these street animals.

Zulu had a fractured pelvis, extensive bruising and retention of urine on arrival. How he suffered. We had to catheterize him, treat for pain and also treat for babesia, a dangerous blood parasite disease that causes severe anaemia and weakness.

Thankfully, with a huge amount of veterinary input, love and care, Zulu recovered. Without us, he would no longer be alive today.

POE

Poe arrived at the sanctuary after being hit by a train. He was so critical we didn't think he would survive. He had multiple injuries including a head trauma injury.

It was touch and go, but we never gave up on him and he nevergave up either.

Poe, pulled through and, despite some neurological symptoms from the injury, he is doing really well now and is out and about at the sanctuary.


Meadow arrived at the sanctuary near to death after being attacked and left severely disabled from a dog attack. Meadow had babesia too, but her survival was only



We can only dream about expansion and having better facilities to take this vital project to the next stage now. We hope 2024 will answer our dreams and benefit so many more desperate animals.

BREAKING NEWS

FLOODING AND EXPENSES



We have had heavy rains in Sri Lanka for many months now, leaving our land wet and boggy. Rainwater from the entire village flows into our lower land sanctuary and we have had to dig more drains and soakage pits. Building new shelter areas for our dogs is an on-going expense, as are repairs to existing structures. The effects of the extreme weather conditions in Sri Lanka, is a challenge in itself. We have had to buy new water storage tanks, a transformer to improve our electricity supply to the sanctuary and now have the expense of paving some sections of the top site sanctuary. All of this on top of our huge running costs and feeding 2500 dogs and cats a day! It's endless...

BIRTHDAY FEEDING PROGRAMME

"He who feeds a hungry dog feeds his own soul"

A huge feeding program was organised by the founder in October. 100's of dogs and cats from the sanctuary to Matara were fed from 5pm to 3.30am for the founder's birthday feeding mission. 350 kilos of food was cooked for this program, in addition to 1000 kilos of food for our sanctuary animals. We started cooking at 4am in readiness and many hungry stomachs were filled.

We also treated many dogs for skin conditions during this program and rescued a pup that was adopted by Kim. A huge labour of love.



WE NEED TO
